English not spoken at home	Is English spoken at home?	0 = No 1 = Yes
Socio- Economic Status (SES)	Mothers/Fathers highest education level	If one parent attended university then SES was assigned a one, otherwise zer
Gender	Gender	0 = Male 1 = Female
Views of Parents	My parents want me to do a degree course	1 = Strongly disagree5 = Strongly agree
School Effects ¹	School attended by the student which was then reduced to two dummy variables by education sector	CS =1 if attended a Catholic school; IS =1 if attended an independent school.
Views of Teachers	My teachers have encouraged me to go to university to do a degree	1 = Strongly disagree5 = Strongly agree
Losing friends	If I did a degree I would lose touch with my friends	1 = Strongly disagree5 = Strongly agree
Only for the wealthy	University is really only an option for wealthy people	1 = Strongly disagree5 = Strongly agree
Internet	Internet access at home	0 = No $1 = Yes$
